- The structure of the Freight Customer Track Access Contract (FCTAC)
- Model clauses front part
 - No Conditions Precedent; e.g. usual provisions on safety and licensing don't apply to a freight customer
 - > Clause 5
 - how the access rights can be exercised; the 'draw down mechanism'
 - > Timetable Agent
 - Clause 11
 - Claims Allocation and Handling Agreement: deleted as freight customers not party to it
 - Liability annual cap of £5M; access rights not be made available to the freight customer

FCTAC

- Schedule 1– contract particulars
- Schedule 2 information to assist making access proposals or Train Operator Variation Requests
- Schedule 3 forms of notices (hand out)
- Schedule 4 variations to services
- Schedule 5 services: the Rights Table




> FCTAC

- Schedule 6 events of default
- Schedule 7 access charges
- Schedule 8 (not used)
- Schedule 9 limitation of liability
- Schedule 10 network code modifications



The relationship between the FCTAC and the Freight Operating Company Track Access Contract (FOCTAC)





- > How a FC can obtain a FCTAC (and access rights)
 - > Approach Network Rail
 - > Agree the type of access right/s and its/their characteristics
 - > General approval/specific approval
 - Consultation
 - Submission to ORR
 - Many of the above processes are managed by Network Rail



- How a FOC obtains a FOCTAC
 - > Approach Network Rail
 - General approval/specific approval
 - Consultation
 - Submission to ORR
 - Many of the above processes are managed by Network Rail



- How access rights are used by a freight customer's 'FOC of choice'
 - The draw down mechanism will enable the FC to convey access rights directly to a FOCTAC
 - They can then be 'exercised' by that FOC to transport the customer's goods
 - If the FC decides to change its FOC it can reclaim the access rights by issuing a revocation notice
 - > It can then draw them down to its new FOC of choice



- The draw down and revocation notices
 - > Template format contained in Schedule 3 of the FCTAC
 - Contain Rights Table which will replicate (some of) the access rights from the FCTAC



- > The FC's role under the FCTAC
 - Awareness and knowledge of the engineering access statement and timetable planning rules
 - Deal with draw down mechanism and revocation notices familiar with Rights Table
 - Under the FCTAC the FC is able to appoint an Agent to deal with such issues



The FOCTAC

- Like the FCTAC, it's based on the ORR model freight track access contract
- > Provision which recognises the draw down mechanism
- Indemnity against multiple liability



Network Code

- If in a conclusions' publication identifies changes to Network Code undertaken to recognise FCTACs and FOCTACs

 - > UIOLI
 - > Freight transfer mechanism !!
